Alliteration	Words that start with the same sound. For example, colourful creeping caterpillar.

Bullet points	An organisational device that uses small dots or symbols to indicate separate items in a list or separate sentences or paragraphs.
Caption	A short explanation underneath a picture or diagram.
Chapter	A main division of a book, sometimes numbered or with a title.
Character	A person or figure within a story.
Comprehension	The understanding of what has been read.
Contents page	A list at the front of a non-fiction book detailing the chapters in the book.
Cover	The front part of a book.
Creative writing	Story writing.
Definition	The meaning of a word.
Dialogue / direct speech	A conversation or speech that is written down as part of a piece of narrative text.
Dictionary	A resource that lists the words of a language and their meanings in alphabetical order.
Edit	To make a change or correction to a piece of work.

Effect	The impact of a piece of writing or a literary device (for example, alliteration) on the reader. How the writing makes the reader feel, think or react.
Explanation text	A piece of non-fiction writing which describes a process, such as how something works. Usually written in the present tense, and may have bullet points, numbers and/or pictures or diagrams.
Fact	A statement that is true.
Fairy story	A tale about magical and imaginary beings and lands.
Fiction	A piece of writing which describes imaginary people and/or events.
Glossary	A list of words and definitions found at the back of a non-fiction book.
Guided reading	Reading the same book with a small group of children, led by an adult.
Heading	The title of a piece of writing, usually used for non-fiction, which may then be broken down further using sub-headings.
Illustrator	The person who draws the pictures for a book or poem.
Imagery	Words used in writing which create a strong effect in the reader's mind by appealing to one or more of the five senses.
Index	An alphabetical list of names or subjects found at the back of a non-fiction book, with reference to the pages on which they are mentioned.
Inference	Part of reading comprehension. Reaching a conclusion based on evidence. For example, 'I think Goldilocks is naughty because she goes into the Three Bears' house and eats their porridge when they are not there.'
Information text (non- fiction / non- chronological report)	A non-fiction text which gives information on a particular subject. Sometimes called a non-chronological report as it gives information without referring to the order in which things happen.
Instruction text	A non-fiction text which tells you how to complete a task.

Intonation	Varying the tone of voice when reading a text aloud in order to make the text interesting for the listener. A good sign that a child is becoming a fluent reader.
Label	A word used to say what something is or a feature of it.
List	A number of connected items or names written one below the other.
Narrative writing	Writing a story or an account of events.
Non-fiction	Fact based, not made up.
Onomatopoeia	Words which describe a sound, but also sound like the sound they describe. For example, 'buzz', 'woof', 'boom'.
Picture	A painting or drawing.
Plot	The main events of a piece of fiction.
Poem / poetry	A collection of words or ideas that express ideas or emotions.
Prediction	Using evidence from a text to say what may happen next, what events may unfold or how a character may behave.
Proofreading	Checking a piece of writing to make improvements and correct errors.
