Foundation Stage Reception Barn Owls, Snowy Owls and Tawny Owls

A warm welcome to our new children and parents! The first couple of weeks this term will be making sure the children are happily settled into the routine of their Reception class.

Personal, Social and Emotional Development



The first theme focuses on 'Being Me in My World'. The children will learn how to help each other to feel welcome in class and will be working with other to make the school a better place. They will understand why it is good to be kind and how to use gentle hands. The children will understand why it is important to work well

with others and learn how to become a responsible person. They will be designing class rules and be introduced to the red/green behaviour chart which encourages them to make appropriate choices for a happy learning environment.

After the half-term holiday the theme will be 'Celebrating Difference'. The children will identify something they are good at and understand everyone is good at different things. They will understand that being different makes them special. The children will begin to know they are all different but the same in some ways. They will learn how to solve problems with others and understand it is important to use kind words and know how to give and receive compliments. During Science Week, the children will be finding out through a range of practical activities about the importance of keeping healthy through exercise, diet and self-care.

Communication and Language



Activities will include learning to talk about stories and pictures and looking in more depth at the main characters. The children will be retelling the traditional tale of 'The Three Little Pigs' and will be introduced to Makaton signs, which will support them in retelling this story in their own words. They will sequence story

cards, use puppets, props and musical instruments to act out the story. The children will listen to different versions of the story and use their imagination in class role play areas. There will be opportunity for your child to bring items which are special to them in the 'My Special Box' for 'Speaking and Listening'. Please look for the date of when it will be your child's turn. A letter will be sent home and displayed on the classroom door.

Physical Development



Fine Motor skills: The children will be mark making and practising their handwriting. They will also be cutting, threading and rolling different materials to continue developing their fine motor skills.

Gross motor skills: The children will have many creative activities to develop their gross motor skills. During outside play sessions, they will experience a range of apparatus to develop their use of space, balance and coordination. In addition to this, they will have a PE session in the hall each week.

Literacy



Reading: Letters and Sounds will teach initial letter sounds and how to use them to read and spell simple VC and CVC words, such as at, in, cat, sat, pin and tin. The children will also learn to recognise simple rhyming words. Letters and Sounds are taught daily in small group sessions starting at 9:10am. The children will be heard reading individually twice a week and other opportunities for reading will be available

daily. They will develop their knowledge of rhyme and learn how to create a simple rhyming string through rhymes, poems and rhyming activities. To begin with, the children will be bringing home reading books with no text. When your child shares their reading book, please encourage them to use the illustrations to create their own story. This helps them to develop their language and storytelling skills. In the next couple of weeks, the children will receive a reading book with simple decodable sentences. Please encourage your child to use a 'reading finger' to point to each word when reading.



Bug Club: In addition the children can access 'Bug Club', an online reading scheme the school subscribes to. On the inside of your child's red reading record book is a sticker detailing your child's username, log-in code and school code. A letter will be sent out providing more details of this super online reading scheme.

Writing: The children will be learning how to hold a pencil correctly using the 'pick and flick' technique and learning how to form lower case letters correctly. They will see writing modelled by the adults and explore mark-making through a range of emergent writing activities. The children will be learning how a sentence is structured, focusing on beginning a sentence with a capital letter, including finger spaces between words, checking the sentence makes sense and using punctuation to complete the sentence. The children's sentence will develop to include descriptive and action words. They will be writing shopping lists, labelling parts of a wolf and writing a factual sentence about wolves. They will be creating story books based on 'The Three Little Pigs' story and designing a 'WANTED' poster and writing speech bubble choosing a character from the tale of 'The Three Little Pigs'.

Mathematics



All mathematics activities will relate to the tale of 'The Three Little Pigs'. The children will be counting to 20 and recognising numbers to 10. They will be comparing numbers using objects and developing their understanding of the 'one

more than' and 'one less than' relationship between consecutive numbers. They will be exploring the number three and using mathematical symbols to create addition calculations. The children will be developing an understanding of subtraction by removing one wolf at a time from a pack of wolves. They will be using the language of 'more' and 'fewer' to describe how many wolves for

wandering on the grassland. The children will be recognising common 2D shapes and using mathematical language to describe the properties of these shapes. The children will be using the language of capacity when pretending to be the third little pig building a brick wall.

Numbots: In addition the children can access 'Numbots', an online maths educational platform the school subscribes to. On the inside of your child's red reading record book is a sticker detailing your child's username, log-in code and

school code. Children receive certificates at the end of each week for activities they have completed.

Understanding the World



The children will be investigating the force of the wolf's breath using a hairdryer, predicting which of the three materials the pigs used will withstand the force of the wolf's breath. The children will be using natural materials to create the different habitats wolves live in and finding out how wolves hunt for food, their appearance and family life. The children will be investigating the immediate environment to learn about

the changes in the natural world during the seasons of autumn and winter and using iPads to record the changes. They will begin to create a 'Seasonal Changes of a Tree' book which focuses on one tree in the school grounds throughout the year. The children will look at the colours of autumn and investigate leaves and seeds from trees using magnifying glasses. They will be learning about how their class peers celebrate the festivals of harvest and Diwali. The children will learn about the journey made by Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem and find out how Christians celebrate the birth of Jesus around the world.

Expressive Arts and Design

They will learn action rhymes and play a variety of percussion instruments. They will learn to listen and respond to music based on the featured stories. The children will have opportunities to use a variety of materials and techniques to create small and large scale pictures linked to the traditional tale of 'The Three Little Pigs'. They will use junk box resources and natural materials to create a little pig's home. The children will use straws to investigate the force of blowing paint and create puppets using a range of materials. They will be looking carefully at photographs of wolves, learning how to mix colours using a palette and how to apply the brush to the paper to create the texture of the wolf's fur. The children will learn action rhymes, and use props and musical instruments to act out 'The Three Little Pigs' story.
